

Identifying Worn Seatbelts:

Key Indicators

Fraying or Cuts in the Webbing

Visible fraying or small tears indicate weak seatbelt integrity.

Caused by frequent extension and retraction or improper use.

Fading or Discoloration

UV exposure weakens seatbelt fibres, making them brittle over time.

Uneven fading may suggest weakening fabric strength.

Difficulty in Retraction

Seatbelts should retract smoothly. Any slow, uneven, or stuck retraction means the mechanism may fail in an emergency.

Damaged or Faulty Buckles

Buckles should latch securely with a firm click. If they jam or release too easily, replacement is needed.

Twisted or Stiff Webbing

The seatbelt should lie flat without stiffness or twists, as these reduce its effectiveness.

Monthly Fleet Seatbelt Inspections

Integrate seatbelt checks into scheduled fleet inspections.

Train fleet managers to recognise early wear and tear.

Maintain digital records to track seatbelt replacements.

Conduct mandatory seatbelt safety training sessions.

Provide drivers with a checklist to self-inspect seatbelts.

Establish a reporting system for damaged seatbelts.


